All or part of which may still be true but in recent times distinctions between Liberals and Conservatives have blurred. Once Conservatives were individuals in comfortable circumstances or least ones who had beneath them classes which it was politically correct to despise and denigrate. They believed that any change would most probably be for the worse and therefore were vigorously anti-change. For material and/or psychic reasons Liberals were very dissatisfied with what was and had been. They believed that changing economic, social and political rules would improve their lot

and that of lots of others. Therefore they were vigorously pro-change.

However in the here and now identification is not so simple. To add to the confusion: Conservatives and Liberals, despite still having very different agendas for us, now adaptively look, dress and speak

CYNIC: Intellectual Peeping Toms who take perverse pleasure in gawking at naked realities.

DETAILS: Awkward factual matters, which may be discussed and/or modified later in private.

ELITISTS: Formerly the crème de crème of society. Now despised as prissy fools who act like they are better than you and may be.

FAIR AND BALANCED: News reports spun just as you want them to be; often based on one's own press releases.

FLIP FLOP: To change a previously held opinion or position. Opponents who do so show lack of principle, weakness of mind, morals and memory.

GENDER EQUITY: Gives females the opportunity to be as greedy, rude and self righteous as male chauvinist pigs.

HARSH REALITY: Makes plans and proposals of opponents unworkable; exposes them as empty promises or only wishful thoughts.

JUDICIAL ACTIVISTS: Judges who make decisions, which you and your party do not like.

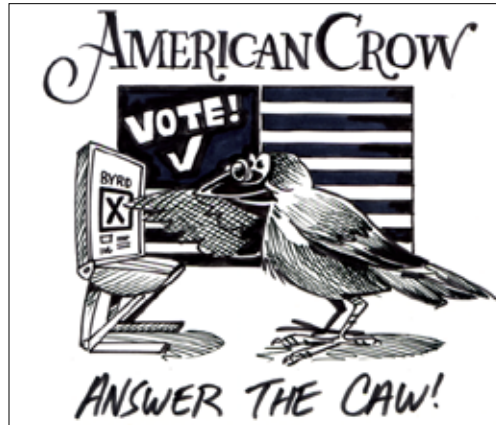
KNEE-JERK: Repeated, ridiculous response made by mindless opponents who refuse to flip flop (qv).

LOFTY GOALS: Reflect one's soaring vision of the future or, the inability of opponents to face harsh reality (qv).

LOBBYISTS: Unsavory minions of Special Interests (qv) who – unlike one's own Trusted Advisers – unduly influence and probably bribe weak, greedy public officials.

MILITIA: Public spirited groups of avocational soldiers; or, cells of apprentice domestic terrorists.

NEGATIVE CAMPAIGNING: A tactic commonly employed by candidates who hope to convince voters that they are the lesser of two or more evils.

PARTY LINE: Malicious nonsense parroted by another party.

QUBBLING: A tactic by obstructionists (qv) to spoil policies and decisions by pointing out logical absurdities, structural flaws and harsh realities (qv).

RED MEAT: Bloody revelations, which must regularly be fed to the base (qv) to energize it.

SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS: Groups whose selfish concerns are repugnant to disinterested groups.

TOLERANCE: A virtue: making allowances for the flaws of otherwise good people of the

right persuasion. A vice: making allowances for very bad, threatening or wrong people.

TRADITIONAL VALUES: Inherited or long standing habits, opinions and taboos which everyone should be required to make their own.

URGENT: As in problems which should be faced but not just now.

VICIOUS: Unexpectedly effective criticism of or attacks on their competence and character which candidates find difficult to ignore or deny.

WELFARE: A desirable state, which must be vigilantly guarded by those who enjoy good fortune prospects and health; or, a wrong-headed state policy, which corrupts the un-serving poor by unfairly enriching them.

XENOPHOBIA: An affliction caused by geographical isolation, cultural in-breeding and perhaps genetics since it now frequently occurs among those whose ancestors were Know Nothings.

YOU'RE WORSE: Popular, often effective response to vicious (qv) criticism and attacks.

ZEALOT: A supporter of a rival candidate or party who is obsessively concerned with demented ideas and causes.

AGRICULTURAL HISTORY

Cache crop

Joshua Klein has produced an entertaining internet video (www.TED.com) about his successful efforts to induce crows in his vicinity to put coins – which he supplies – into a vending machine-like contraption that then spills out peanuts. This does not greatly advance our appreciation of the cognitive abilities of crows since there are many reports of their behaviors which seemingly involve as much or more general intelligence, decision-making and memory. (Lawrence Kilham once remarked that when they have need to crows probably can, and do, do a lot of things which would astonish us if we knew and understood them.) Nevertheless the ingenuity and patience required to motivate free ranging crows to use a vending machine is quite impressive.

Klein includes several conventional ecological homilies to the effect that there should be more inter-specific learning and cooperation. In fact this has been going on between us, crows and ravens throughout what we think of as the historic era. They, for example, have figured out that people have created urban and suburban environments which for them are far safer (fewer owls and gunners), richer (in fast food droppings and such) and better lighted than are gloomy rural and wilderness areas. On the other hand they have given us subject material for thousands of myths and legends. Also as some paleohistorians have suggested they may have given us the idea for agriculture. Whether the latter is a good or bad thing is a matter of continuing dispute.



This conceit runs as follows: Corvids cache things in crevices, under leaves, in holes in the ground. Included among things they cache are seeds. Often the corvid who made it did not need or feel inclined to return to the cache and if it contained seeds they would eventually germinate. After a long time some people living in what is now Iraq picked up on this. One of them had a eureka flash and said if we did that, pretty soon we'd have a lot of plants growing right here which are just like the ones the seeds came from; maybe we can find some that will turn into wheat and oats, melons and so on and so on. This explanation is too simple and too homocentric.

A better one is this: Because of their caching habits crows came to understand the basic principles of agriculture long before people did. They saw that it would have some benefits. If they seeded a large field, they might eat better and oftener, work less at hunting and gathering, be able to spend more quality time with their families and otherwise socializing. But they also understood the disadvantages. Seeding a field struck them as being hard, dirty, undignified work. Also it would oblige them to stay in one place

for months on end and cut back on their exploration and travel time. So initially corvids put aside the idea of agriculture as an interesting but impractical one. However, eventually various crows in various parts of the world had their own eureka moment.

Crows have long been contemptuous of the abilities and behaviors of people but nevertheless have kept them under close observation.

This is partly because of curiosity about our odd ways but also because they are constantly looking for new ways to exploit us and our works. Finally various crows in various parts concluded that while agriculture was beneath their kind they might be able to get people – who if trashy were at least energetic – to do it. Making a great show of themselves to call attention to their works, corvids began planting the seeds of edible plants close to the caves, camps and huts of people. When the seeds sprouted they came back and made more show of themselves. After many generations the eureka Iraqi caught on and invented, so he or she claimed, agriculture. Ever since people have engaged in stoop labor the fruits of which (along with grains and some vegetables) corvids continue to enjoy.

All available records indicate that there are now many more corvids and people than there were in pre-agricultural times. However, beyond that the longer-term consequences of this inter-specific transaction remain, of course, to be determined.

ASCAR now numbers — so think some who enjoy counting things — about 900 members. Alphabetically and in terms of interests and attitudes members range — an expression — from academics to Zoroastrians. But only the Editor and an associate minion know who and where they all are. This is in keeping with the Corvi Privacy Act that forbids

those who know from talking about or to other corvis or using their names and addresses in the Chronicle without permission. The CPA is occasionally tested by purveyors of crow curios wanting access to mailing lists.

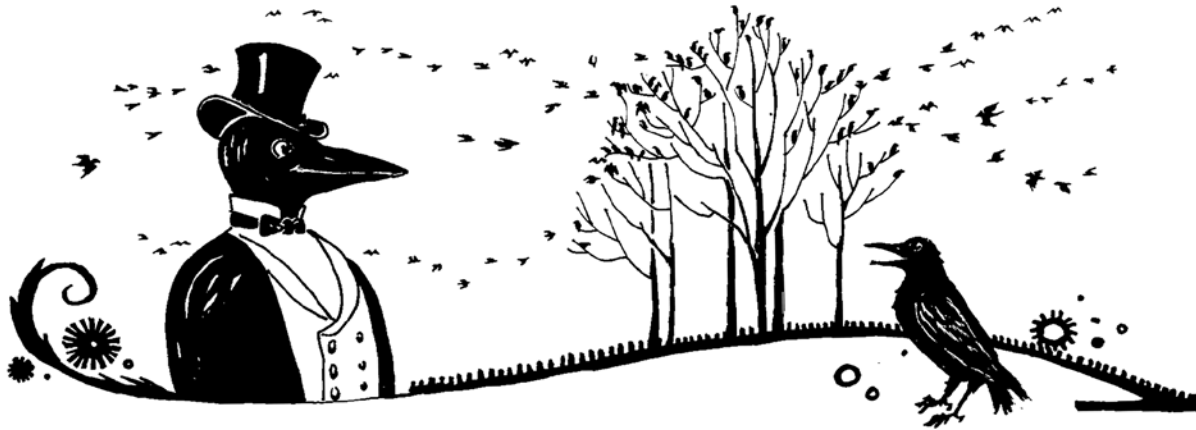
However, because many mem-

SAUNA

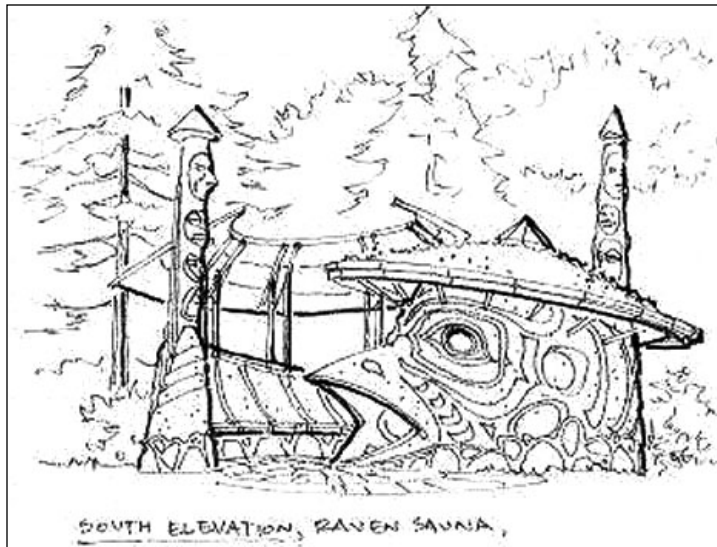
Laughing Raven in Portland, Ore., received permission from a neighboring artist, Vanessa Renwick, to print her sketch of a Raven Sauna.

Renwick, a filmmaker and installation artist, is also the founder and janitor of the Oregon Department of Kick Ass. <http://www.odoka.org> Her last name may mean: "From where the ravens roost."

Renwick designed the Raven Sauna in part to celebrate the 100-year history of her house. "I thought it would be nice to spend some time really focusing on giving some love back to it and its grounds. I've been so very fortunate to be living here for about 17 years now with my children and various friends. The first night I slept in it I awoke to a strange noise. It was a crow perched on a banister outside the window, tilting its head and cawing at me."

Her home and grounds are headquarters for ODKA, which Renwick described as a place for a community of artists, musicians and tramps to create, socialize, entertain and rest their weary bones.

Given Renwick's meaning, the artist said, "It seemed fitting to make this cob sauna in the image of a bird. We took inspiration from the NW Totem Poles



and Long Houses in Cascadia for the design. (I know that drawing looks like a chicken, but we will get a raven beak on it when we build it!)

"...We thought a sauna would be a welcome addition in our frequently damp climate. This sauna will be open for intermittent use by the community listed above as well as for occasional events. We're doing our part to keep the riffraff clean!"

The Raven Sauna is one of 22 projects that comprised Portland's Village Building Convergence 2008. VBC8 was a 10-day event from May 23 - June 1, in which neighborhoods worked to build shared public places that they have envisioned, designed, funded, and will maintain for themselves. VBC8 included hands-on education in permaculture design and construction, ecological

building, and public art. All projects were built through collaboration, community conversations and commitment of a neighborhood to strengthen itself. Special guests presented musical hootenannies throughout the sauna-building event.

The Village Building Convergence is part of Portland's City Repair Project Placemaking Program fulfilling City Repair's mission to educate and inspire communities and individuals to creatively transform the places where they live.

WATCH YOUR LANGUAGE!

We received a letter within a letter a while back from Corvi 611 who said s/he is a certified intepreter who tries to mimic bird calls but isn't sure how the birds interpret her calls.

Dear corviphiles, here is a post I sent to CoBirds, the listserv for the Colorado Field Ornithologists. I share it with you all, any info appreciated.

Dear CoBirders, I am used to ravens' highly varied calls, but today I heard some new sounds. There was a raven behind the Fruteria in Boulder, at Bluff and 29th streets, sitting on a fence that backs up to a trail and a small pond. I always notice ravens, but this one was

making sounds like a red winged black-bird, kind of a high-pitched trilling, so I really noticed. S/he was also doing bill clacks between trills. I started slowly walking that way, making some more regular raven calls, and the raven stayed put, continuing to make the trills, alternating with some dove-like coos, and a high, clear “caw” that was much higher and clearer than a crow. I was able to get to within about five feet of the raven who continued to make these sounds, bill clacks, and fluffing neck feathers. When I made some regular “kraaak” sounds as well as some of the higher caws, s/he looked at me several times with its head at a 90-degree angle, kind of like puppies when they are curious. It was very interesting. The raven wasn’t nervous or scared, and stayed for about five minutes doing these sounds, and looking at me like that, cocking his or her head side to side (unfortunately, I can’t make bill clacking sounds or the high trill). After about five minutes, the raven took off for a building to the south and another raven (who was silent). Could whoever forwarded another raven message I sent last year to Berndt Heinrich please do that again, as I am really curious about this: I will also send it to the American Society of Crows and Ravens, which, if anyone is interested, puts out a fine, irregular, non scientific journal for corvidphiles (which may or may not be a word) www.ascaronline.org. Thanks

The post mentioned about last year was about an experience in Rocky Mountain National Park on the Christmas Count. There are not a lot of species that high in December, but, of course, there are ravens. I had been making raven calls trying to see if anyone would answer, and there were any ravens calling. Then a few hours later, I heard one far off. I began to make “kraaak” sounds, and the raven came closer, both of us making sounds. The raven came to where three of us were, then landed a short ways away and a little above, on a rock. S/he was jumping up and down on the rock, flapping wings and making the sounds. I was making the sounds but not jumping

up and down. It was very cool, although I really didn’t know what I was saying, and since I am an interpreter, that’s a little unusual. Finally, the raven flew off, and we were left wondering what it was about. Someone sent it to Berndt Heinrich, who said they do that when they are nervous or checking things out.

I hope I hadn’t said anything rude, I certainly didn’t mean to. Ravens are too cool and too interesting to be insulted, even unintentionally. Thanks for your publication, I forgot my corvid number, silly me.

POLLY WANT A RESCUE

Corvi 51 of Gaithersburg, Md., sent the following clipped from the Sunday, April 29, 2008,

reflected the site’s history as a landfill and illegal dumping ground as well as addressed failed cultural conditions, waste and underground infrastructure. Owens perched the raven on a sculpture of plumbing pipes jutting out of the ground to resemble a branched trunk that provided the raven’s perch, and also created a fountain that dumped

oil into a rusted oil drum. The jutting branched pipe and raven were encircled by discarded rubber tires and crumpled oil drums. The raven’s posture was described as dejected. Corvid Agonistes from another election year

EDITOR'S NOTE: When the board agreed to run an election issue special, we reached back in our correspondence to find a 2004 column from The Clarion (Pa.) News submitted by Corvi 17, who in 2004 was living in Berlin, Germany. The Clarion News published the interview with Corvid Agonistes in September 2004, according to Tom DiStefano, Clarion News staff writer, who remains acquainted with this thoughtful crow. DiStefano noted he and another friend, a parrott fancier, often debate whether the American Crow or the African Grey parrott is the smarter bird. DiStefano kindly gave us permission to reprint his interview. While the crow's comments on the approaching presidential election four years ago are dated, the comments on humans remain fresh.

THOUGHTS. WORDS. ACTIONS.

Ed Poe's Raven said "nevermore."
But I'm haunted by a crow who says, "Thoughts. Words. Actions." I guess "irritated" is a better word than "haunted." Corvid Agonistes landed on my windowsill and said it again.

"It's your Human presidential election," said the Crow. "It makes no sense."

"So what's it matter to Crows?"

"We Crows would rather ignore Humans. But we can't. We hate to admit it, but Humans are important to Crows."

"I suppose you want Crow suffrage now."

"Well, it might help. An intelligent electorate..."

I cut him off. "So Citizen Crow, how would you vote if you were allowed?"

"I know how I would vote. But we Crows don't all agree. We talk about it a lot, but it's just talk. Thoughts. Words. Actions."

"There you go again," I said. "Besides, what do 'thoughts' have to do with an election?"

"Good question for you Humans. You don't seem to be thinking very well. And

words are way too important to you. So your actions aren't very good."

"Is that what all this 'thoughts, words, actions' stuff is all about? More Crow criticism of humans?"

"It's easy and fun to criticize you Humans," Corvid said. "But there's more. I'm talking about what's important. Words are more important than thoughts. And actions are way more important than words."

"So what's your point?"

"That is one of my points. The first two can be lies. It's easier to lie to yourself than anyone else. Humans being so lazy. It's easy to believe your own lies."

"And it's not hard to lie to others about what you're going to do. Or about what you did. And in political campaigns, about what the other guy did."

"But actions are another story. Because actions are real. Actions can't be lies. But they can be based on lies. That's when things get ugly."

"More insults. Now Humans are ugly," I said.

"Well, yes. No feathers. Big old nose sticking out. Ears like cabbage leaves. Heads all puffed out like a pumpkin. Stumbling around on two oversized legs. Arms good for nothing except for the thumbs on the end. Big lumps of fat..."

"Okay, enough."

"But I'm talking about ugly actions," Corvid continued.

"Like what?"

"Like war. Your President Bush. Didn't seem like he thought very hard about invading Iraq. Didn't have much of a long-range plan. Then Bush and his people said some things... Well, they weren't exactly accurate. So the war isn't going very well."

"So you Crows don't like Bush?" I asked.

"Liking Bush has little to do with it. We're more interested in how things affect Crows. Best ask the Crows in Iraq about the war."

"Then this Kerry fellow. Talks well. But he's a Human. What he says may or may not have much to do with what he does. Unknown quantity."

"So you're saying Humans should vote for Bush. After all, changing horses in the middle of a stream..."

"Might be a good idea," Corvid interrupted. "If the horse can't swim. And the stream is deeper than you thought."

"So Humans should vote for Kerry?"

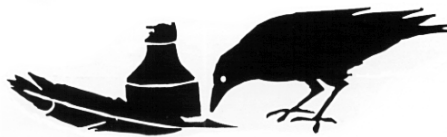

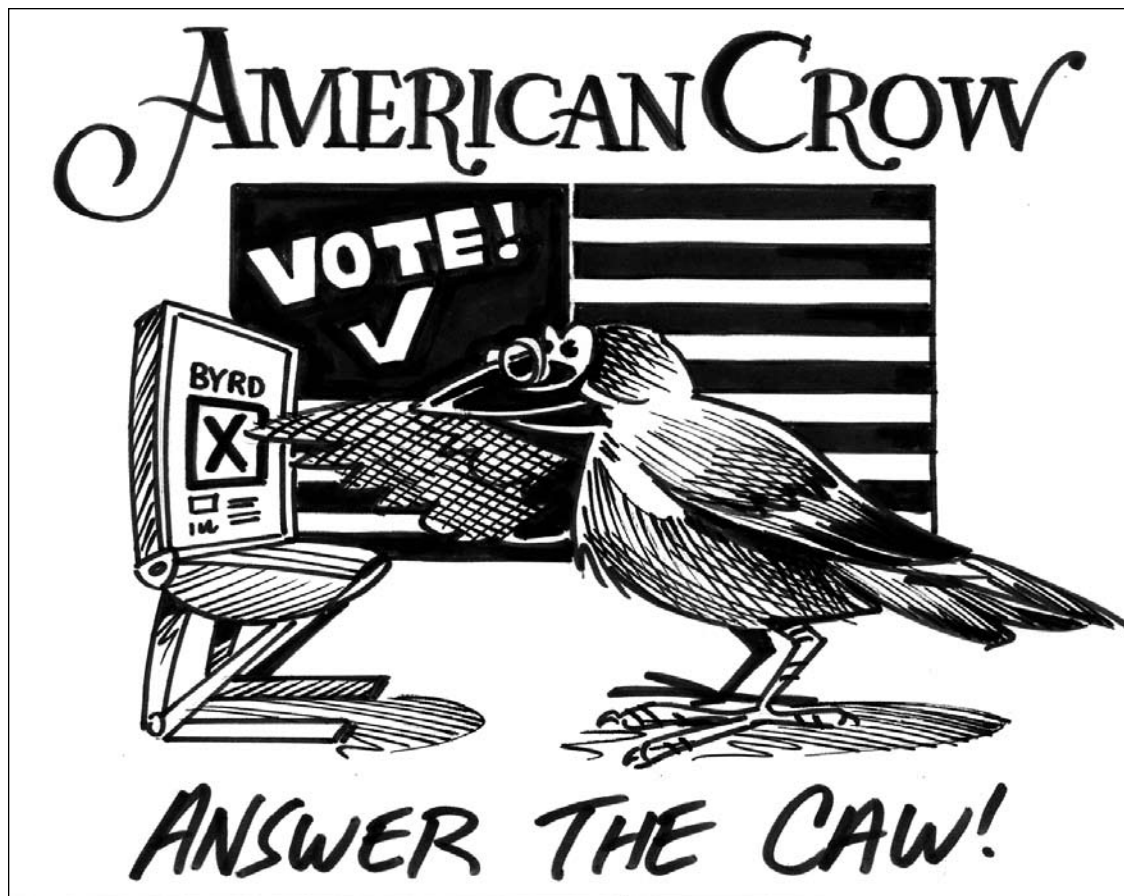
